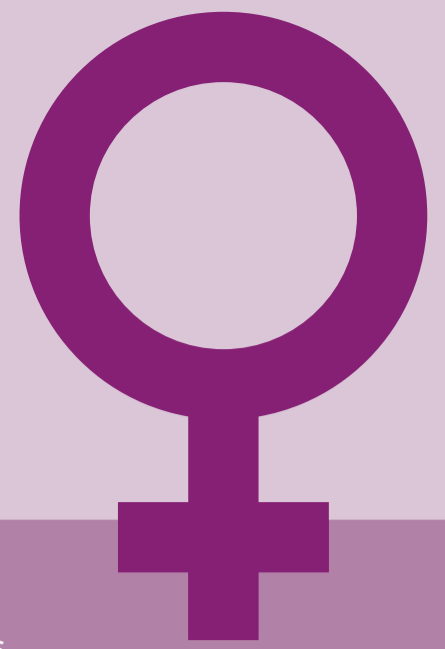

Sustainable Development Goal 5

Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls

Targets

- End all forms of discrimination against all women and girls everywhere
- Eliminate all forms of violence against all women and girls in the public and private spheres, including trafficking and sexual and other types of exploitation
- Ensure women's full and effective participation and equal opportunities for leadership at all levels of decisionmaking in political, economic and public life

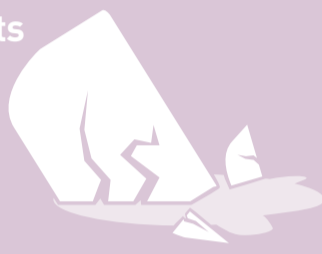


The time used in collecting water by females every year is over:

50 billion hrs

this makes them more susceptible to:

- Injury** from unsafe collection points
- Injury** from carrying heavy loads
- Attack** from animals
- Violence and Rape**

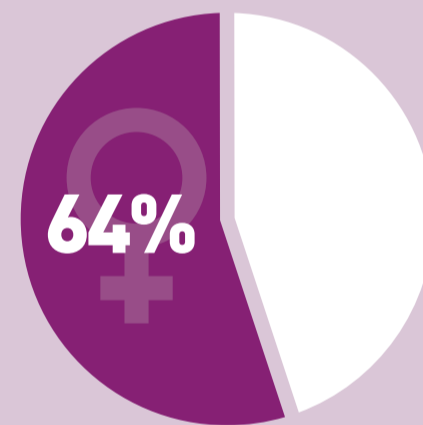


2/3 of the world's **792 million** illiterate adults are women

3 GOOD HEALTH AND WELL-BEING



Sustainable Development Goal 3

Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages

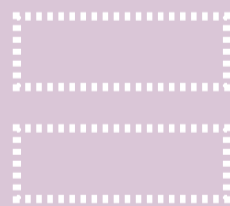
Targets

- Reduce the global maternal mortality ratio to less than 70 per 100,000 live births
- End preventable deaths of newborns and children under 5 years of age, with all countries aiming to reduce neonatal mortality to at least as low as 12 per 1,000 live births and under-5 mortality to at least as low as 25 per 1,000 live births

In sub-Saharan Africa a woman's maternal mortality risk is

1:40

In sub-Saharan Africa 49% of births attended by skilled health personnel



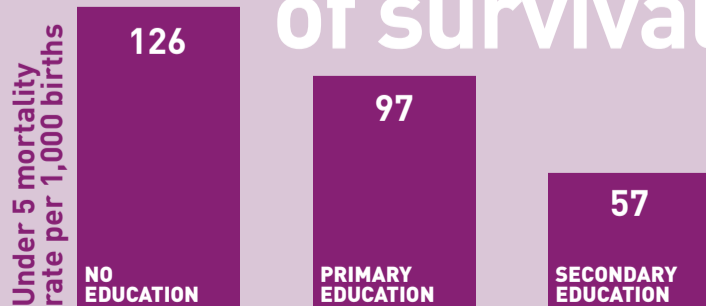
In Australia a woman's maternal mortality risk is

1:9,000

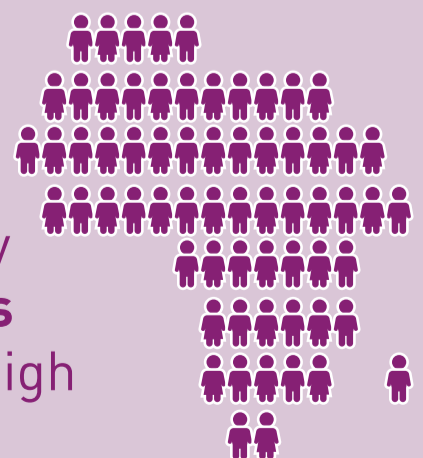
In Australia 99% of births attended by skilled health personnel

In poorer countries, children of **educated** mothers have

twice the chance of survival

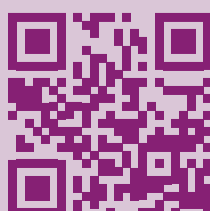


In Africa, around **1.8 million** children's lives could be saved every year if their **mothers** had a minimum of High School education.
